Our final wellbeing focus for the year saw the children explore the concept of forgiveness and how it helps us move forward in friendships. But, what exactly is forgiveness?



### Q: How long have you taught at Quintilian?

A: I have been at Quintilian for 9 years! I was 23 when I started and still lived with my parents! I feel like I have grown up at Quintilian!

## Q: What does forgiveness mean to you and how do you see this show up in Quintilian students?

A: Personally, I choose not to carry anger, hurt, and sadness with me. Forgiveness is about letting go of hurt and giving ourselves and others the opportunity to heal. We all make mistakes—it's a natural part of life, especially for children, who are still learning and growing. At Quintilian School,

forgiveness is an important part of our community. It helps us work through challenges and misunderstandings, creating an environment where everyone can move forward. When we forgive, not only do we heal, we build trust, and grow stronger. Forgiveness deepens friendships by reminding us that no one is perfect, but everyone

deserves understanding and grace. At Quintilian, the act of forgiveness is one of the many ways we learn to support each other, grow together and become better versions of ourselves.

## Q: If you could have any superpower to use in the classroom, what would it be?

A: I would love to be able to 'duplicate' myself so I could be in lots of places at once!

### Q: What's your favourite way to celebrate a student's achievement?

A: I love making my students feel recognised, valued, and motivated to keep doing their very best. Things like showcasing their work, praising my students in class, sharing achievements with families or giving rewards like extra free time are always fun ways to celebrate.

## Q: What's the "secret teacher skill" you use to instantly quiet a noisy classroom?

A: Making a really funny sound effect or bursting out into my favourite song is always a winner!

## Q: What's the most adventurous thing you've ever done?

A: Scuba diving with about 15 Ragged Tooth Sharks is definitely at the top of my list! Low level helicopter flying through river gorges also comes close!

their dinner of burgers and salad and going on


a night time tour of the school, which even included popping into Principal Elliott's office!
